Information from NHS England to schools:

We are recommending to our pupils and staff who feel unwell, that they get tested if:

- they develop one or more of the main coronavirus symptoms:
- a high temperature
- a new, continuous cough
- the loss or change of their sense of taste or smell, or
- they are recommended to get tested by a healthcare provider (e.g. GP or nurse)

If a child or staff member develops one or more of the main coronavirus symptoms described above, only they should be tested. There is no need for their households to have a test, unless they are also symptomatic. Unless a child or staff member has one of the three main coronavirus symptoms, they should only be tested if instructed otherwise by the local authority, health protection team or their GP. As schools and colleges across England return, pupils and students may feel unwell for example with a sore throat, stomach upset or a headache. These pupils and students do not need to book a test but may need to stay off school or college and seek medical advice through their GP or pharmacist as usual.

In line with NHS recommendations and as an extra precautionary measure we have decided that a child will need to remain at home after a bout of sickness or diarrhoea for 48 hours.

KEY REMINDERS ABOUT TIMINGS FOR THE DAY

KS2

Start of day: 8.35-8.50 End of day: 3.00-3.10

KS1

Start of day: 8.45-9.00 End of day: 3.10-3.20



- Please do not arrive on site before the time slot for your child's class, at the start or end of the day.
- The classroom doors will not open until the times stated above, and early arrival on site will result in the paths becoming overly congested.
- You can arrive at any time in the time slot stated above no learning will be
 missed and registration will not happen in the mornings until the 15 minute time
 slot has closed.
- The front gate will not be opened until just before 8.35am and 3.00pm.
- Please could we ask that only one adult per family bring children on to site, as much as possible.
- Please call the office should you wish to pass a message to the class teachers, to avoid crowding around the classroom doors.
- If you have a child in KS1 and KS2, please aim to arrive around 8.45 which will be enough time to drop children in different classes around the school, without the need to keep you waiting.

ONE WAY SYSTEM

Our one way system is up and running! Thank you to everyone for following the white arrows and following any signs that are up around the school - it is very different to usual! Please stick to the paths and do not cut across the fields, and please call the office if you need to speak to them as we are currently not allowing 'drop-in' visits.
